

## Inter-spinal Spacer Implant Procedure (ISSIP)

What is it?	This procedure is FDA approved and therefore covered by most insurance carriers. However, NYSWC does not accept all forms of insurance. An ISSI is an "H" shaped, titanium implant inserted between the spinous process (the boney projections off each vertebra). ISSIP is indicated for patients who have leg/buttock/groin pain, numbness, and/or cramping, with or without back pain when standing or walking, which is relieved when they bend forward or sit. You must undergo at least six months of conservative non-operative treatment before having this procedure.
Why is it done?	To treat pain, numbness, and/or cramping in the legs when standing and relieved with sitting, caused by lumbar spinal stenosis (LSS). A doctor who is specially trained to perform the procedure will use an imaging machine (X-ray) and specialized tools to place a small spacer through a small incision in your back. The device is designed to limit extension at the level causing the pain while preserving mobility and body structures.
How is it done?	A small incision is made to gain access to the affected space. The appropriately sized implant is delivered through a small metal tube. Live X-rays called fluoroscopy are taken to confirm the correct placement of the implant. The incision is then closed with sutures or staples.
Is there any preparation?	You will be put to sleep with a medication given though an IV (tube) in your arm and you will breathe on your own This is known as Monitored Anesthesia Care (MAC). A trained anesthesia clinician will monitor you continually while you are asleep.
What to wear?	Please wear loose, comfortable clothing. Please leave all jewelry and other valuables at home.
How long does it take?	We ask that you arrive 60 minutes before the scheduled time of your procedure. The procedure TAKES about 30 minutes to 1 hour. You will be in the recovery area about 15 minutes.
You must tell your doctor if you have had any of the following : Risks of this	<ul> <li>* If you have ever had an allergic reaction to contrast dye or anesthesia, you <u>MUST</u> tell your doctor <u>BEFORE</u> the procedure is performed.</li> <li>* You <u>MUST</u> tell the doctor <u>BEFORE</u> this procedure if you are taking blood thinners, have a blood disease that affects clotting, have a bowel obstruction or have an uncontrolled infection</li> <li>* Pain in the area where the needle(s), equipment and device were inserted. procedure include, but are not limited to:	<ul> <li>three days and can be treated by using ice and mild analgesics (pain medications), such as Motrin, Naprosyn or Tylenol.</li> <li>* A reaction to the local anesthetics. These reactions do not usually require further treatment.</li> <li>* Bleeding, hemorrhage in the area of the procedure due to damage to blood vessels, phlebitis or</li> </ul>
	<ul> <li>hematoma</li> <li>* Infection in the area of the procedure, which may result in abscess or meningitis. This is a rare risk.</li> <li>* Increased pain.</li> <li>* Possible surgical intervention, re-operation/revision due to migration (movement) of the implant</li> </ul>
	from the original position causing damage to adjacent bone or soft tissue including nerves. * Spinous process fracture. * Nerve damage, tear in the spinal cord covering, diarrhea, paralysis, stroke and even death. * Sensitivity or Allergy to the implanted material

	that if you attempt to drive yourself home after this procedure, you could be involved in an
	automobile accident with injury to yourself and/or others, as well as damage to personal
	property belonging to yourself and or/others. Be aware that you must not make important
	decisions, leave your children unsupervised, use heavy equipment or drive an automobile for
	24 hours after this procedure.
Can I eat Breakfast?	• You must <b>NOT</b> eat or drink <b>solid food</b> or <b>milk</b> for <b>at least 8 hours</b> before your procedure.
	• You are permitted to drink <b>no more</b> than <b>8 ounces</b> of clear liquid <b>UP TO 4 hours BEFORE</b>
	your procedure: such as water, coffee/tea (-no milk, no cream, no nondairy creamer),
	clear apple juice, club soda, ginger ale, seven up, cola, ( <b>no orange juice</b> )
	• <b>STOP</b> all <b>food</b> and <b>all fluid</b> 4 hours before your procedure.
Can I take aspirin,	NO. You <u>must</u> STOP taking ASPIRIN, products containing ASPIRIN*, and NSAIDs**(anti-
or products containing	inflammatories), 7 days prior to the date of your procedure.
